From my heart to yours:

What is In your Hand?



When God called Moses to lead the Israelites out of Egypt, he began to make excuses. The Scripture says, "But Moses said to God, 'Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and that I should bring the children of Israel out of Egypt.' God said, 'I will certainly be with you''' (Exodus 3:11-12a). The narrative continues, "Then Moses answered and said, 'But suppose they will not believe me or listen to my voice; suppose they say, 'The lord has not appeared to you.' So the Lord said to him, 'What is that in your hand?' He said, 'a staff''' (Exodus 4:1-2). When God calls us to His service, He always asks, "What is that in your hand?" We are never asked to use what we do not have. We are never asked to do what we cannot do. Rather, we are expected to use what we do have; and we are expected to do what we can do.

Moses used his staff to beat the "advisors" of Egypt at their own game, and then led the Israelites on a freedom march. David employed a sling shot and his background as a shepherd who had protected his flocks from wild animals to defeat the giant Goliath and win a victory for God's people. A little boy offered his meager lunch of loaves and fish to feed the multitudes.

Joseph of Arimathea provided his own tomb because that's what was needed at the moment following the crucifixion. Dorcas used her needle and thread to make coats and clothing for the poor. We are responsible for using our abilities and resources for the Lord. Jesus said, "For everyone to whom much is given, from him much will be required; and to whom much has been committed, of him they will ask the more" (Luke 12:48b).

The rich young ruler had a fortune but failed to share it in helping others. A poor widow had just two small coins but sacrificially gave them. You see, it is not what you have that is important, but what you use. At Robert Louis Stevenson's funeral, a friend said, "Robert died with a thousand stories still inside." It may well be that we will die with a thousand kind words unspoken, a thousand encouraging notes unwritten, a thousand feelings of compassion never acted upon, a thousand prayers for others never prayed, a thousand generous deeds undone, and a thousand opportunities to share Christ with others lost. How can we use what we hold in our hand? What will we do for the Lord?

First, we must <u>discover our spiritual</u> <u>gifts</u>. Paul wrote, "Each one has received his own gift from God, one in this manner and another in that" (1 Corinthians 7:7). Ask God to help you discover what He wants you to do. A spiritual mentor or Christian friend can guide you.

Second, we must <u>develop our spiritual</u> <u>gifts</u>. Again Paul wrote, "Do not neglect the spiritual gift within you" (1 Timothy 4:14). Learn what you can about the gift or abilities God has given you.

Finally, we must <u>deliver on our spiritual</u> <u>gifts</u>. Peter encouraged, "As each one has received a gift, minister it to one another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God" (1 Peter 4:10). So what is in your hand? Don't be like the one talent man who buried his gift and was condemned by our Lord. Find your place of service.
